Laudation by Chrys Kiyala

Sehr geehrte Gäste, geschätzte Kollegen, Preisträger, meine Damen und Herren, Guten Morgen

It is my great honour to participate in this grandiose event of the 3rd International Science prize that lauds outstanding works of scholars globally on the Theme: "Impacts of Wars and Global Environmental Change and Climate Change on Food Insecurity, Hunger and Migration" — an Award of the Third International Science Prize 2025 of the HGBS.

We find ourselves in a tipping point of human history post the Industrial Revolution, beginning in the 18th century, during which we saw a large-scale fossil fuel use that is contributing to anthropogenic climate along with increased carbon dioxide emissions and the resurgence of vile wars in Africa, in Europe and conflagration of the Middle East where Israel unleashed assault on Gaza is a clear demonstration of humans' brutality on other humans and their natural environment. We will have no peace, and no life is we destroy this home that houses humanity, biodiversity and ecosystems.

Congratulations to all the six laureates of the 2025 and 3rd ISP for Peace and ecology, particularly the two science prizes winners, notably Dr. Angela Jill Lederach, who is being honoured for her book, *Feel the Grass Grow: Ecologies of Slow Peace*, and to Dr. Matthew G. Gillett, who is award-winner for his monograph, entitled *Prosecution of Environmental Harm before the International Criminal Court*, published by Cambridge University Press in 2022.

Finally, we commend all The HGBF for P&E in the Anthropocene, all the jurors of the 2015 ISP, all stakeholders who have so eloquently demonstrated our collective yearning for integrity of creation (one of the four-characteristic dimensions of the "Steyler Missionare" [Divine Word Missionaries].
